

Dear Friends and Partners,

As Executive Director of the UCF Center for the Study of Human Trafficking and Modern Slavery, I am proud to reflect on another impactful year of collaboration, education, and progress in our shared mission to combat exploitation and support survivors. This year, we expanded our reach, deepened our community ties, and delivered transformative training and resources to those on the front lines of prevention. We have now **educated more than 6,000 hospitality students** to identify and report trafficking in their workplaces and community.

A cornerstone of our efforts remains our trusted partnerships with national and international organizations whose leadership and dedication continue to strengthen our region's coordinated response to trafficking. Together, we have hosted awareness events, supported survivors, and provided critical resources to community stakeholders.

We are especially proud of our training initiatives for **Orange County Youth Leaders**, designed to equip the next generation with the knowledge and tools to identify and prevent trafficking in their schools and communities. Empowering youth with prevention education is one of the most effective ways to build resilience and awareness from the ground up.

On a global level, our team has partnered with **ECPACT International to develop an anti-trafficking curriculum tailored for tour guides** within the travel and tourism industry. This work underscores the need for targeted, sector-specific solutions that empower professionals with real-world knowledge to spot and report red flags.

Our student leaders, Knights of the RELM were celebrated this spring by winning the Liberator Award for the "Best Student Group" in their efforts to combat trafficking. They hosted a panel for 500+ high school students, hosted two Red Sand Project events, and volunteered for the 17th Annual Human Trafficking Awareness Conference. We are so proud of you all! Go Knights! Charge ON!

The work is challenging—but it is also deeply rewarding. Every connection we make, every student we teach, and every survivor we support moves us closer to a world free from exploitation.

The Red Sand Project is a participatory artwork created by *Molly Gochman* that uses sidewalk interventions and earthwork installations to create opportunities for people to question, connect, and take action against vulnerabilities that can lead to human trafficking, modern slavery, and exploitation.



In recognition of Human Trafficking Prevention Month, we hosted a series of events focused on raising awareness and promoting education and prevention efforts against human trafficking. Along with our partner **United Abolitionists**, **Inc.**, we hosted the **17th Annual Human Trafficking Awareness Conference** on our campus, the Rosen College of Hospitality Management, which brought together experts, community leaders, and advocates to address the global crisis of human trafficking and modern-day slavery. We are a community that works collaboratively in our anti-trafficking efforts, and it starts from the top with our elected officials.

The 15th Annual Polaris Star Awards is an annual event that brings together individuals, organizations, businesses, and activists who are dedicated to combating human trafficking. This prestigious award ceremony, hosted by United Abolitionists, Inc. and the UCF Center for the Study of Human Trafficking and Modern Slavery, honors and recognizes the outstanding efforts and initiatives made in the fight against modern-day slavery and exploitation.

The Polaris Star Award was named after the Polaris Star, also known as the North Star, and is what slaves used to find their way north to freedom along the Underground Railroad. This award is given to the modern-day abolitionists in our communities who are leading the fight against human trafficking in their profession and/or sphere of influence. **Since 2011, 105 individuals have received one of our various awards.**



A 35-year law enforcement veteran, the last 25 years being with the Department of Homeland Security, he finished his federal law enforcement career serving as a Senior Advisor and the Senior Law Enforcement Liaison at the Department of Homeland Security's Center for Countering Human Trafficking (CCHT) in Washington, DC where he was responsible for external engagement, stakeholder development, national policy, and strategy implementation. Prior to his role at the CCHT, he served in a variety of management, supervisory, investigative, and operational positions within Homeland Security Investigations to include many years working inside the U.S. Intelligence Community on matters of national security and counterterrorism. His human trafficking work predates the TVPA.

Dr. Gilmer is known as a leader, innovator, change agent, fixer, and, most importantly, a collaborator. He is a dedicated defender of human rights and a fighter against crimes such as human trafficking and child exploitation. He is passionate about building and equipping teams to effectively combat these crimes, assist victims, and hold offenders accountable for their crimes. He is in high demand across the country as a speaker, lecturer, and trainer to communities, faith-based organizations, law enforcement, non-profit organizations, non-governmental organizations, and on college campuses. His background and experience allow him to communicate a compelling message to deliver vital information, drive change, and direct action.

Dr. Gilmer holds a Bachelor of Science degree in Interdisciplinary Studies from Liberty University in Virginia, a Master of Natural Resources and Global Sustainability degree from Virginia Tech, a Master of Counseling degree from Luther Rice University in Georgia, and a Ph.D. from Columbia International University in South Carolina where his research focus was on the organizational outcomes of collaborative, multi-disciplinary teams used in human trafficking investigations. He has completed additional courses of study at the National War College, Joint Special Operations University, and the Senior Executive Leadership course at the Defense Equal Opportunity and Management Institute. He is a member of the International Association of Chiefs of Police (IACP), serving on the IACP's Victim Services Committee. With a strong desire to work with students and young adults, he recently served as a mentor to the 2023-2024 cohort of Frederick Douglass Fellows, a program of the Human Trafficking Institute, serves as as an adjunct professor and lecturer at multiple universities, and sits on human trafficking research center advisory boards at both the University of Houston and the University of Central Florida.

He is also a proud veteran, having spent a career in the military, retiring in 2019 from the United States Coast Guard Reserve, where, in his last assignment, he served as the Gold Badge Command Master Chief for the Coast Guard's Fifth District, encompassing Washington, DC, the Mid-Atlantic Seaboard, and about 5000 personnel.

He makes his home in the "Magic City" of Birmingham, Alabama, where he is also a proud graduate of the 2023 class of Leadership Birmingham and the first law enforcement officer to be nominated and selected to the program in over 30 years. He is also the recipient of the 2024 William Wilberforce Lifetime Achievement Award for his efforts in countering human trafficking.



Beginning with a crime summit in 2014 and a three-day "Tips to Trail to Recovery" human trafficking workshop in 2015, a comprehensive, systemwide approach to combatting human trafficking began to take shape. This effort culminated in the 2017 publication of the **first** edition of Human Trafficking: A Systemwide Public Safety and Community Approach. That inaugural edition served as the foundational chronicle of coordinated efforts to address trafficking across multiple sectors. Seven years after the original publication, the second edition published in 2024, reflects a significant evolution in knowledge, collaboration, and best practices across sectors. While the first edition comprised ten chapters and contributions from nineteen experts covering six sectors, the new edition features fifteen chapters, contributions from forty-six professionals, and insights from eleven distinct sectors. In essence, it represents a complete overhaul and expansion of the original work and is a vital resource for anyone engaged in the fight against human trafficking.

Today, the second edition presents a significantly expanded and updated compilation. It is simply an encyclopedia to fight human trafficking. It incorporates new components of the systemic response and highlights the critical roles played by investigators, prosecutors, judges, corrections professionals, social services, community and faith-based organizations, criminal justice agencies, healthcare providers, the hospitality industry, media, and educational institutions. This edition features insights and strategies shared by leaders, practitioners, and experts working on the front lines. It underscores the collaborative nature of this effort, emphasizing that it truly "takes a village" to fight human trafficking and support survivors. The book is structured across comprehensive chapters and spans multiple disciplines to present a thorough, in-depth analysis of human trafficking. Importantly, this edition also amplifies the voices of five survivors, offering readers powerful, firsthand accounts of lived experiences. Their stories convey the stark reality of human trafficking and serve as a call to action.

Moreover, this book is designed to support a collective effort with a comprehensive set of tools and insights. **Key features include an** inventory of nearly sixty current and future anti-trafficking laws and legislative acts, framework outlining three levels of risk factors across the phases of trafficking, and a tiered interview approach for identifying risk factors in juveniles. Additional resources include case studies, a prosecutor's toolbox, an exploration of the impact of trauma and Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs), analysis of trafficking trends and indicators specific to the hospitality industry, and a strong emphasis on the role of data and research in informing policy and practice. These and many other features make this edition a vital resource for professionals across disciplines working to prevent trafficking and support survivors.

This book is a masterpiece of voices from leaders across numerous sectors in our village that come together to fight human trafficking. We have taken the systemwide approach to the next level and want the world to know that bringing loosely connected networks together to develop a common understanding of the challenges of human trafficking creates everlasting solutions to reduce this abomination and save lives. **





GLOBAL CURRICULUM AND TRAINING

In October of 2024, in Vienna, Austria, Dr. Jessica Wickey Byrd had the honor and privilege to meet with global leaders to discuss anti-trafficking efforts to combat child sex tourism and child sex trafficking. She met with global leaders from Belgium, Sri Lanka, Nepal, Australia, Austria, Cambodia, Norway, the UK, the U.S.A., the Netherlands, Italy, Germany, Thailand, the Philippines, South Korea, and India, all focused on collaboratively combating child trafficking. They met for two days of intense workshops - designing a curriculum for industry partners, associations, and schools to use to educate people about this horrific crime. A focus was on education and training for tour guides to be able to identify child sex tourism and trafficking, and how to work with local and national authorities to report the crime.

The goal is for every tour guide in Asia to receive training on how to identify and report human trafficking.

The workshop was led and organized by ECPAT International, a global organization dedicated to protecting children in Asia and around the world. The framework developed outlines core competencies that can be applied across various areas of work and roles that students will assume once they enter the travel and tourism industry.

The Knights of the RELM students facilitated a focus group to review the curriculum through the eyes of Generation Z and provided thoughtful feedback to address child sex trafficking. You can view the full report on the ECPAT website: **ECPAT.ORG**

Dr. Wickey Byrd also presented our anti-trafficking curriculum that we have used to educate more than 6,000 UCF Rosen College of Hospitality Management students to be able to identify and report trafficking.



IN-KIND AND PROBONO DONATIONS


In-kind donations can provide valuable support to the UCF's Center for the Study of Human Trafficking and Modern Slavery.




